Subject-Verb Agreement

In English, subjects and verbs must agree with one another in number (singular or plural). Thus, if a subject is singular, its verb must also be singular; if a subject is plural, its verb must also be plural. Here are some general rules for subject-verb agreement (and a review of singular/plural and count/noncount nouns):

1. When the subject is third-person singular (he, she, it, the dog, my friend, love, coffee, etc.) the verb takes an -s ending:

Sue works at CoHo three days a week.

2. When the subject is I, you, they, a plural noun (books, toys, etc.), or two or more nouns joined by "and," the verb takes no ending:

We like to go to UCD volleyball games. Textbooks are very expensive. My sister and I talk on the phone every day.

3. Some nouns end in -s but are actually singular. Examples include words like news, sports, physics, and economics:

Economics is a very interesting subject. Business seems to be a popular major. The news on campus is we have found a new president.

4. Uncountable nouns—nouns which don't have a plural form—take a singular verb:

Research has guided many of his conclusions. Anecdotal evidence is not always appropriate Homework gives us the practice we need to pass exams.

5. If the subject is a gerund (going, swimming) or an infinitive (to be, to come) the verb must be singular:

Being a student makes me crazy sometimes. To copy someone else's work is dishonest.

6. If the sentence begins with "there," the verb agrees with the true subject, which follows the verb:

There are *ten students* in my math class. There is only one seat left in UWP 21.

Subject-verb agreement errors are one of the most common types of errors. Here are some reasons why these errors occur:

1. The subject and verb do not agree when other words come between them.

Incorrect:	Correct:
One of the students are coming to the party.	One [of the students] is coming to the party.
My lack of friends <u>make</u> me feel lonely.	My lack [of friends] <u>makes</u> me feel lonely.
My cousin from Boston <u>visit</u> every year.	My cousin from Boston <u>visits</u> every year.

2. The verb ending (-s) is left off when the subject is third-person singular or uncountable:

Did you know? Spanish verbs are conjugated to show who/what is doing the action.

Incorrect

He <u>go</u> to class early every morning. *Sugar* <u>taste</u> sweeter than honey. He goes to class early every morning. Sugar tastes sweeter than honey.

Correct

3. An "-s" ending is put on the verb even though the subject is plural.

Incorrect	Correct
Some people enrolls in too many units.	Some people enroll in too many units.
Some of my friends is taking UWP 21.	Some of my friends are taking UWP 21.
